990 Tax Return presentation and review

Chair Mesdag reported that he and his staff had reviewed the organizations 990 tax return. They found everything to be in order. If any board members had questions about the tax filing to let him know.

United Way Branding - Mission Statement Revision

President Stevens outlined the movement of United Way Worldwide (UWW) to work towards a unified branding. With that endeavor in mind he presented the UWW Mission Statement for the boards' consideration with a recommendation that the Board adopt it as the organizations mission statement. He referenced the presentation materials he had shared with the board at the December meeting. The purpose was to impart to all 1800 plus United Way organizations in the network that they need to be sharing the same brand credo, One Network. One Brand, One Voice. "United Way fights for the health, education, and financial stability of every person in every community."

Discussion ensued with concerns raised about utilization of the word fights as well as concerns about not mentioning our partner agency relations. After concerns were raised, the board decided to set the item aside for further work.

Motion: Board Member Parady moved to table the discussion on the mission statement until the May

meeting. Board Member Brittany Pace seconded the motion.

Motion to table the discussion on the mission statement approved unanimously

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United Way Worldwide Annual Meeting Proxy vote

President Stevens pointed out the materials from United Way Worldwide in the packet and asked the Board to approve his action to authorize Patricia J. Turner, Esq., Secretary of United Way Worldwide to cast our proxy as indicated at the United Way Worldwide annual meeting on May 10, 2017.

Motion approved unanimously.

AmeriCorps program -

Resource Development Director Truitt updated the Board on the grant application process. RDD Truitt reiterated the application process for AmeriCorps was submitted, requesting 12 positions at 8 sites across Juneau. Ms. Truitt noted that it would be important for all 12 positions to be filled in order for the grant to remain viable. To that end, all 8 sites report being committed to the process. Ms. Truitt was now focused on working with Serve Alaska and Faith Lee at Sitka AmeriCorps to ensure proper timeline was followed with regard to positing positions and recruiting members. Ms. Truitt reported she has been working on a job description for the AmeriCorps Program Manager position. RDD Truitt explained that positions like that were what she was looking for, explaining that the grant application utilized data from recent Alaska ACES studies to inform the evidence portion. Ms. Truitt noted that AEYC and REACH – also agencies represented on the board – were seeking members. RDD Truitt explained that we should have a funding decision by May 17th at the latest.

CHAIR'S REPORT – Chair Mesdag

Chair Mesdag noted that he had nothing further to report at this time. He thanked board members for staying later to accomplish the work.

Resource Development Director Report - Sara Truitt

Nothing further to report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Stevens reported that he was working on a grant with the R.O.C.K Juneau team from the Robert Woods Johnson Foundation to support the work of the collective impact effort. The Raising Places: Building Child Centered Communities grant if awarded would bring a team of facilitators

to the community to work with the R.O.C.K Juneau members. Raising Places catalyzes local momentum for cross-sector collaboration, engaging diverse partners to build healthier communities where all children and their families can thrive. Through Raising Places, Greater Good Studio will offer a catalytic process—bringing together diverse stakeholders in communities primed to move from ideas to action and to create long-term, sustainable change. Through this process, communities will explore both symptoms and root causes of local challenges, identify leverage points, and create tangible solutions that address these challenges at different levels and types of impact. The specific outcomes of our work together will vary in each community, based on the local interpretation of "healthy, child-centered community" and the challenges they want to prioritize, all of which dovetails nicely with the work of the R.O.C.K Juneau group.

Stevens pointed out his activity report and noted that he had participated in the JCF review of the Hope Fund and CBG block grant applications. The Foundation has awarded \$1.833 million in grants to local organizations. He reported that the presentations for Coeur Alaska employees are completed with what appears to again be strong support from the employee group.

Fund Development = the process of cultivating relationships with people who will support a nonprofit organization. Cultivation is defined as any activity that builds awareness and connection for donors/funders and prospective donors/funders with your organization, and increases your understanding of why someone might give to your organization. Fund development includes fundraising which is the specific methods used to secure charitable donations (e.g. annual fund, face-to-face asks, online, proposals, etc.).



The board of Directors of United Way of Southeast Alaska strongly supports the effort of the Juneau Best Starts initiative. Juneau Best Starts is an initiative supporting high quality Pre-K to improve Kindergarten readiness and student success. Initiated by business and civic leaders, Juneau Best Starts will provide the resources needed to put every Juneau child on a path toward lifelong success.

According to the Alaska Department of Education, less than half of Juneau's kids are prepared to enter Kindergarten and less than 40% of Juneau kids in grades K-12 meet the state education standards. Meanwhile, results demonstrated by Alaska School Districts receiving state funds to provide pre-school have been able to document an increase in scores for those children who attend preschool vs children who did not. Overwhelming scientific evidence tells us prevention/early intervention is the most effective and least expensive way to address critical youth issues such as poor academic performance. School districts where high quality pre-K programs have been implemented, have shown reduction in the demand for special education services, thereby saving valuable financial resources for other pressing needs. Positive effects include academic benefits, health improvements, reductions in crime and improved economic outcomes such as higher earnings and reduced need for public benefits. Longitudinal studies such as the Perry High Scopes Study demonstrate that high-quality pre-k leads to higher lifetime incomes. Noble Prize winning economist James Heckman has shown a rate of return to society on investments in pre-k and early education about 10%.

A community effort, Best Starts for Juneau's Kid's aims to improve the health and well-being of Juneau's youngest citizens by investing in strategies focused on children under 5, such as high quality child care and universal high quality pre-school. They will invest in strategies to "sustain the gain" for K-12 youth by providing school connected individual support and resources and additional out of school academic related physical and social activities to keep youth healthy and productive. Ongoing efforts will support evaluation, data collection and improving the effectiveness of services.

Implementation of the Juneau Best Starts program will be overseen by CBJ, United Way and the Juneau Community Foundation in cooperation with a steering group of business and community leaders. The strategy for this effort is not to start new programs but to strengthen and connect the energy and creativity of current private and public sector providers and programs using evidence based solutions.

The board of Directors of the United Way of Southeast Alaska supports development of high quality Pre-K programing in Juneau to improve Kindergarten readiness. We encourage our community to invest in early education so as to develop academic, social and emotions skills, sustain that gain through high school graduation, and ensure the most effective outcomes for all young children in Juneau.

Keep Young Families in Juneau and Support Youth In October

Many Juneau people ask why many young people who grew up here decide to leave Juneau. Among key factors that impact Juneau's livability, especially for young families, is the availability, affordability, and quality of Juneau's child care and preschool.

(If you go to www.juneaubeststarts.com you will find recordings from young families impacted by Juneau's lack of adequate child care/preschool.)

Child care/preschool, along with affordable housing, good health care, and other community services are each critical components of a "family friendly" community, and also a key component of Juneau's Economic Development Plan.

Safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool is **critical community infrastructure**. Many scientific studies of the developing brain conclude that the ages O-5 are the most critical in healthy brain development. High quality child care and early learning is a key component in developing healthy successful students and healthy successful adults. Lack of such services, like our current situation in Juneau, can also add to parental stress and make it harder for families to succeed. (For example, Harvard University, Center on the Developing Child, http://developingchild.harvard.edu/)

But why should our community do something about its child care and preschool?

The economic model for child care and preschool simply does not work well - not in Juneau, nor anywhere else in the U.S. Basically, the amount families can afford to pay is most often not sufficient to encourage people to enter the child care and preschool industry, even though there is a high demand. For example, the industry is currently not able to pay staff a living wage that fosters stable, well trained teacher/providers even with subsidies like a reduced facility cost. (According to the Juneau Association for the Education of Young Children (AEYC) the average annual wage for a child care worker in Juneau was \$26,600 in 2015.) Therefore, without some outside help, like financial support from a community, we will NEVER be able to have enough safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool. This priority is also part of Juneau's adopted Economic Development Plan.

But **should a community local government** help support child care and preschool?

In fact, providing services that are needed by a community is the purpose of local governments. For example, communities made the decision long ago to provide a free education for every child starting at age five. Unfortunately at that time no one knew that from birth to five is the time when most critical to a child's brain and personal development, and teaching/learning is most effective.

But can Juneau **afford** to have safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it?

YES, for about the cost of one semester of K-12 school Juneau can support five years (ages 0-5) of child care and preschool. This can be accomplished by working with the private and non-profit sectors with sliding fee scale support for families, directly supporting teacher training and stability by offering pay incentives, and helping develop high quality curriculum and activities for each provider. Each of these strategies has been tested in other communities, and these strategies have also been used successfully in Juneau on a smaller scale.

This coming October, Juneau citizens will vote on <u>renewing</u> the current 1% temporary sales tax. In the past, this part of the current 5% sales tax has been used for capital projects, like building the Valley Library or fixing existing buildings and infrastructure. 1% of the sales tax yields at least \$8.5 million per year. Using ½% of the 1% (\$4.25 million) would keep the sales tax at 5% (No Tax Increase) <u>and</u> fund safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it. It would also fund improved prenatal and family support and fill some holes in our declining services to K-12 age youth, such as drug and alcohol prevention and intervention. The 5 year authorization of ½% of sales tax allows voters to decide in five years if this has a good use of public funds.

Is safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it a community priority and key capital infrastructure?

Many people say that our youth are our most important resource. It is true. A key argument for building a new library in the Valley was to serve youth. Of course, operating a library, or any other public service, has significant long term operating costs paid for by taxes. Making safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it has the same goal and changes the lives of every child in Juneau forever. By supporting youth this way, the private and non-profit sectors will use their creativity to make the facilities available.

How would safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it compare to other capital projects?

Harbors: Juneau does not have enough boat stalls for all of the people who own or want boats, so the community builds more boat stalls. Juneau only has about a quarter of the day care and preschool "slots" it needs to serve Juneau's families. We need to provide more "slots" for our young families.

Water: If Juneau had toxic leaded water pipes like Flint Michigan, it would absolutely replace the water pipes. Social scientists describe the impact of adverse childhood experiences as "toxic stress" that actually prevents normal development of the brain of

a young child. But high quality child care and early learning has proven to help identify and treat "toxic stress", and build resilience in young children to overcome it. (See https://highscope.org/perrypreschoolstudy)

Skiing and skating: Juneau has used public funds to build, improve, and operate a ski area, ice rink, and many other parks, trails, etc. Much of the emphasis is on providing youth with wholesome activities and making Juneau more "family friendly" and a better capital city. Providing safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it is likely the greatest thing Juneau could do to make Juneau one of the most family friendly communities in the nation, the best capital city, and nurture a high level of successful student and adults while reducing long term incidence of crime, substance abuse, etc.

Roads: A safe well maintained system of roads is a very high priority to Juneau residents and ranks high is spending priorities. According to scientists, safe, affordable, available, and high quality child care and preschool for every family and child who wants it helps families actually build permanent positive "neural pathways" in the brain that increase the likelihood that every youth in Juneau will "get where they want to go." (http://developingchild.harvard.edu/)

Citizens of Juneau have always approved helping our youth if there was a clear need and an affordable solution. A dedicated group of volunteer citizens and civic leaders working together have presented a clear plan to give Juneau's youth the Best Start possible. Regarding steering and improving the delivery process over the next five years can be done by the CBJ Assembly and/or a group of citizens and experts they designate.

- **WHEREAS**, preschool students enjoyed positive academic outcomes lasting into elementary, middle, and high school and led to higher high school graduation rates and greater likelihood to graduate college,
- **WHEREAS**, results demonstrated by Alaska School Districts receiving state funds to provide preschool have been able provided documentation of student progress an increase in scores for those children who attended preschool versus children who did not; and
- **WHEREAS**, prevention/early intervention is the most effective and least expensive way to address critical youth issues achieving long term savings in a wide range of local social and law related service costs; and
 - WHEREAS, building a family friendly environment is a huge economic driver in communities; and
- **WHEREAS**, high quality preschool programs have a more pronounced positive effect on children from low-income families; and
- **WHEREAS**, longitudinal studies such as the Perry High Scopes study demonstrate that high-quality pre-k leads to higher lifetime incomes; and
- **WHEREAS**, Noble Prize winning economist James Heckman has shown a rate of return to society on investments in pre-k and early education above 10%.

Dear Mayor and Assembly

Re: Fixing child care/preschool and other youth infrastructure.

We represent Juneau Best Starts, a group of volunteers working to make Juneau the most youth and family friendly community Alaska, and develop Juneau's economy. The end product we feel Juneau needs to strive for, is a community that:

- Has much less crime and vandalism and fewer addiction problems resulting in a stronger community, significant long term local government savings, and higher local tax revenues.
- Has more successful K-12 students because many more students enter kindergarten "ready to learn" as defined by the State DOE, and all youth receive better support throughout their school years.
- Has more jobs resulting from expansion of the care and preschool industry (approx. 100), the
 increased ability of more parents to work to better support their family (250 estimated), and
 new or expanded businesses benefiting from a stronger workforce and employees less stressed
 by child care issues.
- Is a stronger Capital city, and is a family friendly community that is more inviting to young families.

Overwhelming scientific research has proven that the first 5 years is the most important learning time in a child's life and largely sets a child up for success or failure in school and adulthood. Research over 40 years has also documented high economic returns to the community in fewer social, addiction, and criminal problems, plus K-12 school savings, stronger businesses, and a more inviting family friendly community. We would be happy to share this research with you.

Unfortunately, it is generally recognized that Juneau's child care and pre-school system cannot meet the demand, and state and federal budget cuts are stressing Juneau's service net for youth. The problem is recognized in the Juneau Economic Development Plan and has been discussed by the Assembly. The reason the problem has not been resolved has been the lack of an affordable and effective plan.

A full solution for <u>ALL</u> Juneau's kids is affordable and within our grasp. By partnering with existing providers and the private sector we can change the business model for child care and preschool creating adequate high quality care and early learning that is affordable for all Juneau kids and families from ages 0-5 for about the same as the current cost of a single semester (half year) of K-12. (An average of an additional \$250 to \$350 per kid per month.)

One funding solution with a very small fiscal impact is asking voters to allow the use of half of the 1% sales tax that has traditionally been used for "capital projects" this coming October. Assuming that our youth infrastructure is in serious need of rebuilding, this critical infrastructure project is very likely will have a greater positive short term and long term impact on our community than any other.

We ask the Mayor and Assembly to consider this proposal. We would like the opportunity to present these ideas to the Assembly Committee of the Whole or Finance Committee, and answer questions. If you want to see more information now, you are welcome to go to www.juneaubeststarts.org.
